## MLSC TREASURERS REPORT 2024 - 2025 SEASON

I would like to give thanks to the many members who have taken on roles to support and grow the many facets of the Mornington Life Saving club.

A quick summary of our financial position as at 31 March 2025:

**CASH POSITION:** Balance of \$282k at 31st March 2025, down from \$298k last year.

**INCOME:** for the year was \$334k, a \$7k decrease on the \$341k from last year.

**Membership:** Membership income of \$87k was \$10k higher than last season, mainly due to higher rates.

- Member numbers dropped by 54 heads (5%), mainly in the Associate (18) and other member categories (24). The Club increased membership dues by \$10 per head in the 2024/25 year due to inflationary pressures; we intend to keep fees flat in 2025/26.
- Special thanks to Nicole Warner who provides enormous support club-wide on registrations, all grant applications, equipment purchase fulfilment, payment approvals amongst a long list of other activities.

**Grant Income:** received \$35k compared to \$67k last season (in which we received a one-off vehicle grant of \$32k).

- Thank you to Life Saving Victoria, SLSA, Bendigo Bank Mt Eliza, Mornington Peninsula Shire, and the Victoria State Government.

**Kiosk & BBQ:** Income of \$10k up from \$5k last year.

- Special thanks to John and Anthony for their continued efforts to source produce, run setup and pack up and provide support (and the delicious snags!).
- We continued our supported canteen operations this year, with Matt, Scott and the Millies team providing some fantastic food and beverage options and great hospitality, really lifting community engagement. Alongside supporting the BBQ, Millie's and associated activities have made club contributions of over \$5k post year end as part of our fund sharing arrangement, and we expect this to grow in the 25/26 year.



**Schools Program:** Income of \$62k, up from \$57k last season.

- Thank you to Jac Morrow, Kate Quinn, Mark Cornish, Kelly Parrish, and all the team for coordinating the Program.

**Water Training Fees:** generated income of \$11.5k up from \$8k last season; while revenue has increased the club is reviewing its training program during the off-season to ensure its ongoing sustainability.

- Thank you to Ange Seaburgh, Jeremy Warner, Travis Sutton, Damian Brice, Michael Egan, Adam Touzell, Luke Skehan and especially Matt & Lisa McConnell for all your coaching support. The results speak for themselves.
- Thanks also to the Youth Instructors. It was great to see our teenagers continue to help train the nippers. For many of them this is their first job, and they did a fantastic job overall.

**Uniform:** Income of \$19k, down from \$38k last season (which included a substantial timing variance of \$20k).

- A great effort by Liz Bailey, thank you for your support.

**EXPENDITURE:** Annual expenditure was \$382k, up \$100k compared to \$282k last year.

- There's been a significant uplift in expenditure during the year. Some of this is due to genuine increases in activities, some due to cost inflation, also some timing variances with expenses coming in late from the 2023/24 season.
- Key callouts:
  - Higher carnival costs at both the senior and nipper levels, driven by both additional support requirements (lack of parent volunteers or unable to get official training) and timing differences.
  - Higher cleaning and waste costs, where previous favourable service agreements have concluded and increased activity and clubhouse maintenance / servicing is costing more.
  - Higher training costs, where the costs of training have not been fully recouped from associated training fees.



- We're also seeing higher maintenance cost of the clubhouse as the facilities age and reinvestment is required to maintain its functionality.
- The club is reviewing its cost profile during the off season, looking at new opportunities to raise funding and manage costs more effectively.

**NET SURPLUS/(DEFICIT)** for Year: (\$49k), down from \$58k in 2023/24.

Mornington Life Saving Club is a not-for-profit club and aims for a net neutral position over the long term, putting earnings back into the club to enhance our members' experience and provide a valuable service to the community. While not our strongest year financially, the 2024/25 year provides a chance for retrospective and to plan future investment.

I am confident the club will develop expanded revenue opportunities and manage expenditure to sustainably continue current activities and invest in the upgrade of the club's equipment and facilities. We appreciate the members' and community's support as we move in the 2025/26 year.

## MLSC PRESIDENTS REPORT 2024 – 2025 SEASON

A couple of weeks ago I came to the club on Sunday afternoon to do something. Whilst here, all on my own with just the sound of the waves in the background, I began to contemplate: What is the Mornington Life Saving Club? Who are we? Where did we come from? What does our future look like?

Through this process of contemplation, I came to the realisation that the Mornington Life Saving Club has been created by a great evolution. Starting at Mothers Beach over 110 years ago, we have evolved over the years from an organisation that provides individuals with opportunities to learn to swim, to being an organisation that delivers a high class lifesaving service throughout the summer months, delivers quality training and development to all of our members, and is a successful and high performing club at a State and National level in competitions.

We have built two club houses (with one being destroyed by fire) and changed locations. This has been a long and at times difficult evolution but has only been possible because it has been driven by our most important resource, our people. Without members driving the changes through ideas, passion, commitment and dedication this evolution would not have been possible, and we would not be the club that we are today. I am grateful to all those that have come before me for giving us the framework to continue growing our great club.

Being my first year as President, I have thoroughly enjoyed stepping into the role, doing my best to steer our club in the right direction to evolve into something we can all be proud of now and hopefully into the future. For me Season 2024/25 has been marked by a deep sense of accomplishment and pride in the achievements and progress of the Mornington Life Saving Club. It has also given me a great insight into what we need to do to evolve into an even better organisation.

As a Committee I am proud of a lot of our achievements this year, with the highlights for me being:

- **Creation of the Mornington Life Saving Club Child Safety Statement.** This was an important step in making sure that the club is not only compliant with the requirements of Child Safety for Life Saving clubs across the country but also ensuring that we are an inclusive and safe club for all our members. We also appointed our Child Safety Officer, Tim Lambourne, who is guiding and counselling the Committee on what we need to implement and change for the club to be compliant and mitigate risks to the club and our members. A long and difficult process, but a majorly important one that we need all of our members to be onboard with.



- **The delivery of the clubs Vision and Values.** An important step in defining who we are and defining our culture. It is a critical tool that we can use to attract new members and establish partnerships within the community as we can demonstrate what we stand for in terms of behaviours and expectations.
- **End of season members survey, collecting valuable feedback from our members.** Enabling us to be clear about how you feel about the club and what is important to you. Thanks to everyone who responded, your input is important and will be used to drive decisions on processes, programs and club initiatives into the coming season. We will continue to engage with the membership and seek your feedback on what matters to you, we can't guarantee that everything will be fixed or changed but we can guarantee that we will listen and consider all feedback.
- **Millies Kiosk, a real change in the way we manage our kiosk operations.** With the kiosk now being managed by an experienced and knowledgeable team (Scott James and Matt Waters) we are confident that we will continue to benefit from its continued financial success, without the need to allocated valuable club resources to maintaining its operations. Accepting that the first year of operations has not been without teething problems, which was inevitable, the team is confident that through the lessons learnt the coming seasons will be more successful both from an engagement and financial aspect.

The experience within the Millies Kiosk team has also delivered some amazing initiatives around community engagement, providing added vital revenue for the club. The Saturday Sessions have been a big success in terms of the engagement of the local community and the partnership with State of Nirvana is providing the club with added revenue over the winter months through the mobile sauna and yoga sessions. Both initiatives also bring additional foot traffic to the beach, thereby increasing the sales of the Kiosk. Scott and Matt have tabled a number of great initiatives with the Committee that we are working through and will communicate as they come to fruition.

Our key programs once again delivered excellent results this season:

- Our patrollers achieved excellent results in ensuring that as a club we were able to complete every patrol as per the protocols required by Life Saving Victoria, with all required patroller resources and awards present for each patrol. We had almost 28,000 more people attend our beach this year, a huge increase in numbers. Well done and thank you to Nicola Mackinnon, the Patrol Captains and their teams for your outstanding contributions to keeping our beach safe this season.



- We continue to rely on a small and dedicated group of patrollers to do most of the heavy lifting when it comes to hours on the beach. There were 12 individuals who did more than 48 hours of patrols this season, that is 11% of our patrolling population, and this group completed over 1/3rd of the total hours for the club this year. I thank all of our Patrollers for their time and commitment, but a special thanks to those who did more than 48 hours. Moving into season 2025/26 one of our priorities will be looking for ways to attract and retain patrollers and make the patrolling experience enjoyable and engaging, hopefully this will lead to the club having more patrol groups and less time on the beach for all our patrollers.
- The Nippers program was once again well attended, with the weather gods shining upon us and providing good conditions for all sessions. The number of Nippers on the beach every Sunday morning was wonderful to see, watching so many kids enjoying themselves while learning valuable skills and being instructed by such a wonderful group of committed coaches. And the conversations with the parents while walking up and down the beach and their enthusiasm, it fills me with such amazing optimism for the future of our club. A big thank you to our Nipper Captain, Jeremy Warner, for your continued commitment and dedication to the Nippers program and to all of the Age Managers, Assistant Age Managers, Age Admins and parent helpers who make the program the success that it is.
- Our Nippers who competed in Carnivals and State Championships did us very proud. Not only did they compete hard and achieve some amazing results, finishing 2<sup>nd</sup> overall in the State Championships, but the highlight for me was receiving an email from an official highlighting how amazing, behaved and presented our kids were. For me this is a great reflection on our club values and the behaviours that we encourage.
- It was another outstanding season for the Youth and Seniors, a finish inside the top 5 at Senior State Championships being a testament to all the hard work and commitment from all the athletes and coaches. In the absences of a Youth & Seniors Captain, Travis Sutton (Senior Coach) took control of the water program and a lot of the other tasks that would normally be undertaken by the Youth & Seniors Captain. The beach program led by Carly, continues to move forward in leaps and bounds with more of our kids taking to the beach events, with some very good results, it is great to see. Thanks to Travis, Carly and the team of dedicated coaches for your continued commitment to making the program a success.
- Highlight of the Youth & Seniors season was definitely the Men's Open Taplin at the State Championships. A team of Under 17 and Under 19 Mornington kids took it up to some very experienced athletes from some very experienced clubs and finished in



an incredible 4<sup>th</sup> place. It was fantastic to watch, not only the powerful performance of the athletes in the water, but the support from the beach by other teammates was inspirational. More evidence of our values in action.

- Schools Program continues to be a success, both financially and from a community engagement perspective. Jaqui Morrow has developed a well-oiled and robust program that is in hot demand, not only across the peninsula but reaching out to schools in the Casey area, with waiting lists for schools to participate. We had 24 schools enrolled and the number of participating students increased by 664 this season. The program has once again been shortlisted for the Most Outstanding Education program at the LSV Awards of Excellence. Thanks to Jacqui and everyone that assisted with the Schools Program this season, your efforts and contribution have made a huge difference in the lives of so many kids.
- Our training team was once again busy and committed to ensuring our members have the right awards to keep our beaches a safe place for all with Bronze, SRC, First Aid, Advanced Resus Techniques and CPR course and requalification's. Our trainers and assessors were also required to upskill and due to changes in SLSA course content. Thank you to Stewart Lockie and the team of Trainers and Assessors for the countless hours you give to make sure we are ready to do our job of keeping the beaches safe.
- We can't forget one of our major fundraising events, the Twilight Swim. Another success this year, with increase numbers of swimmers, which was fantastically managed by Clare Sacker and Ange Seaburgh and with the help of a lot of others around the club. Well done.

The coming season will be an opportunity for us to progress using some of the initiatives that have been implemented this season. Some of the key focus areas I see as important moving forward are:

- **Future direction and planning** – we need to have a plan for how to move forward and what we want to achieve and be as a club in the future. A Strategic Review and development of a Strategic Plan will be a key project, and we have commenced this with some discussions with an external consultant to assist with the process. Member engagement will be important in this process to ensure everyone is given the opportunity to have a say.
- **Club History** – the evolution of our club is long and interesting. We need to cherish this history and make sure it remains part of our club, and we do not forget those



who came before us. A project to gather historical photos and displaying them in the club is underway.

- **Child Safety** – continue the progress to be as close to 100% compliant. This is important to ensure to make sure we provide a safe and welcoming environment for all members and to mitigate any risks to the club and our members. Safety will always be one our primary concerns.
- **Sponsorship and Funding** – the development of a Strategic Plan will enable us to attract valuable sponsors. Any potential sponsor needs to know who we are, what we do, how we represent to see where the value-add in sponsoring our club is. We will need to also look in to fundraising and what are the best avenues for our club to generate additional revenue through membership and community engagement.

Our clubhouse is showing a lot of wear & tear and as we have grown, space has become a problem. If we want to evolve and our plan in the future involves renovating or extending our clubhouse, we need to have plans in place to raise the capital necessary to make this happen as the current revenue streams are not enough. Assistance from experience and knowledgeable members will be paramount in driving this.

- **Marketing** - a review of how we market our club, and what we do, to the local and wider community. Providing scope to attract potential sponsors and members, as well as engaging the local community through events and fundraising.
- **Communication** – we need to make sure that members are getting the information needed for them to participate and be involved. We also need to engage with the local community and sponsors through regular updates on what is happening at the club. We will review our current platforms and processes and consider changes or updates to make sure we let you know the important information.

In closing, I would like to say that I am proud to be a member, life member and President of the Mornington Life Saving Club. I have always found it to be a great organisation to be involved in.

## MLSC SENIOR CAPTAINS REPORT 2024 – 2025 SEASON

Another great competition season has come to a close! We were truly blessed with an amazing Victorian summer, those consistent light south-easterly afternoon offshore winds, made Mills Beach the place to be most afternoons as we prepared for the season.

Our Senior group kicked off ski training in June, braving the winter months with consistent numbers. Sessions focused on endurance and paddling technique. ## Water Safety

Parents were actively encouraged to join training sessions to increase fitness and progress to bronze certification.

A huge thank you to Stewart Lockie and his team for holding an extra bronze course mid-season, I acknowledge and appreciate the time and effort to run these courses.

The more Bronze-accredited members we have, the greater our water safety coverage — enabling more water-based activities for our Nippers and strengthening our dedicated team of patrollers.



## Fundraising

Once again, the BBQ was a great success — expertly led by BBQ Anthony — and played a key role in raising valuable funds for the club, a total of \$2.6K profit. All funds raised will go directly back into the club, helping to enhance our facilities, support our members, and grow our programs. Nipper parents contributed by taking turns on the roster each week, making it a true team effort.

## Nippers Sessions

Each Nipper session began with a short presentation from me, providing a summary of the previous week's activities and sharing important information about the week ahead. Each age group had its own Team App group, where updates and event details were regularly posted. We also used Facebook groups to share announcements and celebrate achievements throughout the season.

This year, we welcomed four new admin volunteers who did an outstanding job managing communication — from signing Nippers in and out each week to ensuring the BBQ roster was always covered. Their efforts made a big difference to the smooth running of the program.

## Water Quality

Unfortunately, the club was once again impacted this year by sewage spills from South East Water into Tanti Creek, which subsequently affected Mills Beach. Although the beach was closed due to poor water quality, our teams demonstrated exceptional adaptability by



organizing land-based activities where needed and using the opportunity for alternative training rather than cancelling Sunday sessions and midweek practices.

We were also grateful to receive a grant from South East Water, which allowed us to purchase nine new Race One nipper boards.

These boards will be available to nippers at carnivals who may not have their own personal equipment.

True to MLSC tradition, the nippers were thrilled once again this year when Santa Claus made his grand entrance—arriving by IRB on the last nipper session of the season!



After cruising up and down the beach for a couple of laps, Santa touched down and was happily escorted to the SBS vehicle, where he pulled out a big sack of lollipops to share with all 350 nippers and their excited siblings.

1. **Promote Specialist Awards:** Run campaigns encouraging members to take on Silver Medallion, IRB Driver, and Crew roles.
2. **Expand Instructor Pool:** Identify and mentor potential Training Officers to grow our in-house training capability.
3. **Encourage Multi-Skill Pathways:** Support members in diversifying qualifications to build all-round patrolling strength.

## Conclusion

With strong foundational qualifications and a clear path for growth, the club is well-placed to uphold the highest standards in lifesaving. Continued investment in training will ensure our patrols remain capable, confident, and always rescue ready.
